Stop the so-called 'equality' bill from Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP

The NSW parliamentary committee report into the so-called 'equality' bill has been released. The committee recommends that parliament consider the bill, which means it is now up to MPs to decide.

Despite its name, the 'equality' bill is about entrenching unequal treatment. For example, the bill:

- proposes to remove the few existing protections for religious institutions from anti-discrimination lawfare, including schools, healthcare, aged care, welfare and pastoral services, while offering no protections at all for individuals of faith:
- seeks to remove public decency safeguards around prostitution, making it permissible for a person to engage in solicitation even outside a church or school;
- would allow self-identification of sex on official documents such as birth certificates. This will not only put "women only" spaces at risk but make it near-impossible for religious communities to ensure we are wedding only those of opposite sex, ordaining only men, or schooling girls separately from boys. It is one thing to disagree with world religions on such matters, but quite another to deny them the right to practice their faith by making official documents deceptive regarding people's biological or birth sex;
- proposes to **allow international commercial surrogacy**, risking the exploitation of women, especially in poorer countries; and
- allowing children to undergo life-altering medical treatments without parental consent, exposing children to interventions they may well later regret.

Happily, an overwhelming 85% of NSW residents who filled in the survey about the bill said it should be opposed in full

However, even the 85% rejection was not enough for the parliamentary committee to recommend the bill be shelved.

Instead, debate on this bill could begin as soon as 20 June, so there is no time to lose.

We need to once again make our voices heard, this time by telling our local MPs to reject the so-called 'equality' bill in its entirety.

A reflection by the Venerable Servant of God, Archbishop Fulton J Sheen

We have three different ways of living, only three. One, make your own self the guide of everything. Second, follow rules and commandments. Third, make Christ the law of life.

First, be like Narcissus, who looked into the pool, saw his own image and fell in love with it. The first way of living says, I am the rule; I've got to be me; I've got to do my thing; selfishness; egotism. As Sartre, who was the philosopher of these people said, 'My neighbour is hell.' Why? Because he stands opposite me.

The second way of living is to follow the commandments and rules of life. This is a very commendable way of living, but it is very difficult to fall in love with an abstraction. Honesty is the best policy, yes. We know what is right, but we sometimes lack the power to do what is right. Since there is no person involved, it becomes rather difficult to embrace the rule of life, something that is so far away from love itself.

That brings us to the third way of governing our lives. That is: I will try to repay Christ's love for me by living His life. I know that He loved me, because He died for me, as if I were the only person in the world who ever lived. Because He died for me, I will do whatever He wants me to do. I will put on the Christ-mind. My actions will reflect Christ. I will speak about Him when another heart is empty. I will dream about Him. He is my dream, my love. When Christ becomes the rule of life, then His life becomes ours.

I once asked Mother Teresa how she converted 15,000 men out of the gutters of Calcutta. 'How, after dragging these poor mortals into your hospice could you ever evangelise them and teach them the gospel?'

'Well,' she said, 'I didn't. When I took care of them and showed them love, I would say to them, "Would you like to hear about Christ?" And they would say, "Is Christ like you?" "No," I would say, "but I try to be like Him." "Then I want to be a Christian." It was that simple. That is the way we should act. So that the world will, without ever hearing a word from us, know about us and what we stand for.

When we stay close to the good Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, we will see the flesh of all the poor people that we meet as an extension of the body of Christ. That outlook will come through to them. Then we will be Christians. Then we will not be in the mountain of ecstasy nor in the valley, impotent and ineffective. But we will be the kind of Christians the world is looking for.

Gospel Mark 4:26-34

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Jesus said to the crowds: 'This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man throws seed on the land. Night and day, while he sleeps, when he is awake, the seed is sprouting and growing; how, he does not know. Of its own accord the land produces the first shoot, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the crop is ready, he loses no time: he starts to reap because the harvest has come.'

He also said, 'What can we say the kingdom of God is like? What parable can we find for it? It is like a mustard seed which at the time of its sowing in the soil is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet once it is sown it grows into the biggest shrub of them all and puts out big branches so that the birds of the air can shelter in its shade.'

Using many parables like these, He spoke the word to them, so far as they were capable of understanding it. He would not speak to them except in parables, but He explained everything to His disciples when they were alone.
